WHAT?

Making Change with Art & Activism- Craftivism.

Partnering with refugee resettlement agencies & immigrant aid groups to distribute blankets.



WHY?

Donating quilts to those in need of a warm welcome. What better way to say welcome than a pretty, fun and useful blanket? The need is great.



Reusing Samples

Materials compiled from upcycled memo samples from Interiors Libraries.



Your Sickler Welcome Blanket Kit includes:

- 36 7" 8" squares of upcycled upholstery fabric
- 32 2 ½" bias cut edge band strips of varying sizes
- Batting 44" 47" approx. square
- Backing fabric 44" 47" square

What it does Not include:

Your creativity, sewing machine, iron, scissors, rotary cutter, straight edge, embroidery hoop, thimble, safety pins, straight pins, sewing needles, or heavy duty thread










*Instructions are optional

(may use your own technique – there are no wrong ways to make a welcome blanket!)
These are heavy, unconventional quilting fabrics, so it will be a very unique experience!

Step 1.

Layout 36 squares in 6 rows/6 columns. Alternate solids and patterns.






Step 2.

Make 18 sets of 2 squares face to face one solid, one pattern.

Pin the sets together.

Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of each set (this will be your cut line).

Draw two dotted lines each ¼" from solid line (these will be your sew lines).




Step 3.

Sew along the dotted lines.


Step 4.


Cut along the straight line. Press open seams (use a thin cotton cloth to protect your fabric and iron from coatings found on commercial fabrics). Trim the corners of excess fabric.




Step 5.

Layout all 36 new diagonal squares. Get creative to establish your overall pattern!







Step 6.

Combine, pin and sew into 9 sets of 4 squares using ¼" seam allowance, matching the seams. Press open the seams and trim excess. Layout the 9 squares to confirm your pattern.



Step 7.

Combine and sew the big pieces into one blanket approx. 42" square.

Press the blanket and trim excess fabric.



Step 8.

Arrange 4 roughly equal lengths of strips of the edge banding, alternating color size and patterns of pieces. Another step to get creative!

Sew and press the edgebanding strips. Layout and pin the strips to the blanket to attach, one side at a time. Leave an overhang of at least 2 ½". Sew all four sides ending sew line ¼" from ends in order to meet the intersecting seam of adjacent side.



Step 9.

Miter corners and sew. Sandwitch the backing (face down), batting and blanket (face up) together and pin. Make sure the backing and batting exceed the blanket face edges. Top stitch the sandwich together with either a machine, by hand or tie together.

Trim excess batting and backing to the size of the edge banding.

Option to crosshatch to finish edges.

Tip: Hand top stitch is easiest with an embroidery hoop.


Step 10.

Write your personal letter to an immirant recieving your blanket.
